# LATEST TECHNOLOGY FOR SOUTH DEVON

*The League of Friends are delighted to announce the purchase of two 'state of the art' digital mammography machines "Hologic Selenia Dimensions" the newest addition of breast imaging solutions, delivering exceptional digital mammography images*



The machines are complete with touch screen computers, extremely user friendly and will "log in" the Radiographers with just a finger print scan.

This technical installation will attach individual Radiographer's initials to the images they have taken. Equally they are 'patient friendly' with flexible compression paddles which are reported to be more comfortable than the predecessor rigid plates.

The League of Friends has also kindly financed an up-to-date 'Mobile Unit' which will house one of the mammogram machines.

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This mobility factor will allow a unequalled facility for patients, affording extensive coverage to the people of South Devon.

The mammography machine on the Mobile Unit will be used for conventional breast screening, with the digital images being downloaded onto a portable hard drive. This information will be encrypted to ensure security whilst in transit to the hospital.

The second mammography machine will be situated in the Breast Care Unit at the Hospital and will have a d d i t i o n a l characteristics. The extra features will

include the facility to perform breast interventional procedures and to take accessory images which will assist with image interpretation.

The digital mammography machines are also capable of being upgraded in the future to facilitate breast tomosynthesis, which has been demonstrated in trials to enhance mammographic detection of lesions buried in extremely dense breast tissue.

I am also very happy to report that the mammography machine has now been installed on the mobile unit. I travelled to

Bristol this week, with three Radiographers, to inspect the unit and to agree the positioning of the equipment in the screening room.

The second mammography machine is due be installed in the Breast Care Unit in November.

The digital equipment will undergo vigorous commissioning tests by the Physicists before it will be ready to use. Additionally the PACS (Picture Archiving Computerised Storage) has to be

installed and configured to send and receive the digital images to enable the mammograms to be read and archived.

**Rebecca Green, Consultant Radiologist and Clinical Director of the Breast Screening Service writes....**

"Breast Screening is a service that is constantly evolving and updating itself. It remains our best method for the early detection of breast cancer and this means that many women can have more simple treatment and a better outcome.

The new digital screening van will provide Torbay women with the most up to date method for their screening mammograms."

We are all very excited about the new installation and look forward to putting this latest technology into practice

# Chairman's Report

## Who said - "time certainly flies when you are enjoying yourself"

Well this is certainly how I feel at the moment - there is never a dull moment and I am learning so much more about how our Hospital operates and getting to know the marvellous people who work there.

I don't think that I had ever stopped to realise what a huge machine the hospital is - employing some 3500 staff and looking after over 230,000 outpatients each year. In addition some 32,000 patients are treated at Fracture Clinic.

The number of patients having to stay in hospital equates to 138,000 bednights - a 95% occupancy overall. These figures just give a brief overview of just what a busy site this is. This huge volume of 'traffic' takes its tolls on systems and equipment and we are delighted to hear that Torbay Hospital is now able to enter into even more, very necessary, refurbishment programmes.

The one which is going to affect most of us is the refurbishment of Level 2. Work has already started on Paediatrics outpatients; Urology and the Eye Clinic will duly follow. In some cases this will mean that alternative areas will be used to see patients whilst the usual area is being worked upon - but at the end of the process we will have a much more modern department benefiting everyone - patients and staff alike.

We are awaiting the delivery of the new mobile Digital Mammography Unit - which you can read about on pages 1 and 2 of this publication. The League is proud to have been able to fund this ...together with

additional 'arms' for Fred the Robotic Surgery Unit which will enable additional types of operation to be undertaken.

However, fundraising becomes more and more difficult. Realistically we are competing with all the other Charities out there who also need your money. Collections, Cream teas, Garden Parties, stalls at Fetes etc., bring in some money - but not nearly enough for what is required.

In the past legacies were our greatest source of donation to the League - but even this has diminished over the years - so we feel that we are struggling a little at the moment.

If you are reading this and are not a member of the League - then I ask you to please consider becoming a 'Friend' of the League - an application form can be found in this Newsletter or by visiting [www.thlof.co.uk](http://www.thlof.co.uk).

It would not mean that you will suddenly be called upon to do anything - just be part of our family of Friends and this will give us the encouragement and support that we really need.

We are so lucky to have this Hospital - and the League is honoured to be able to offer its support - however what we are really proud of is the fact that we are all volunteers and as such nearly every penny donated goes straight to the THLOF Charity - our highest record is 99p in every pound you give -but on average it is at least 96.5p in the pound.

We are not aware of any other charity which is able to do this - and should you ever wonder where your money is spent - then we will be proud to show you and you can then see for yourself what working together can achieve.

# “A Stitch in Time”

A group of dedicated “Linen League” volunteers are pulling out all the stops to create 26 giant canopies in time for the Torbay Hospital League of Friends’ Garden Party at the Palace Hotel, Torquay on Sunday 3 July.

The regular, enthusiastic and committed 12 volunteers meet every Tuesday afternoon in the hospital’s Board Room with their faithful sewing machines to design, cut and sew the 9ft x 43” canopies required for the League’s Biggest Annual fundraising event.

In addition to creating the canopies the group are also busy making up children’s clothes, aprons, shopping bags, lunch bags and other items to sell on the day.

The “Linen League” is headed by Rachel Evans, an ex-Home Economics and Textiles Teacher and Deputy Head of Stover School. Rachel has given 20 years voluntary service to the League of Friends Linen League. Many of the other volunteers add their own special talent and areas of expertise to the group pool, leading from backgrounds in soft furnishing, quilting and needlework to upholstery.

The Linen League was formed at the Old Torbay Hospital in Higher Union Street during the First World War. The Doctors’ wives at this time decided to get together for the sake of the war effort to repair the sheets needed for the hospital, hence the name “Linen League”.

The Linen League is constantly active today in providing regular items and furnishings for the hospital’s ongoing requirements, including nurses’ tabards for Louisa Cary Childrens Ward, theatre gowns for children, bags to encase tubes, trolley covers, equipment covers, drug pouches, tabards for medicine rounds, bibs for children in John Parkes and Louisa Cary wards, soft furnishings for Intensive Care Unit and various units around the hospital.

Chairperson of the League of Friends, Mrs Lynne Hookings, said of the Linen League’s endeavours “Rachel and her team of excellent seamstresses make the most wonderful items for the staff, the wards and most importantly the patients of Torbay Hospital. They play a very valuable role in supporting the Hospital and we are all very grateful to them.

# TORBAY JOGLE

(John O'Groats to Land's End) 2011

Well, dear readers, it is with some regret that I am writing this short description of how it all went for our cycling team over the two weeks in July this year because, unfortunately, it is all over and done with.

We have completed our 13 days cycle ride from John O'Groats to Land's End having covered nearly 1000 miles in aid of THLoF.

6 cyclists set off on the fine morning of the 3rd of July 2011 from John O'Groats having flown from Bristol to Inverness the night before.

Just to remind you that our team consisted of Mr Mark Ashworth and Mr Stephen Blake (both Consultants Orthopaedic Surgeons), Mr Rupert Pullan (General Surgeon), Dr Jeremy Ackers, Dr Andrey Varvinskiy (both Consultant Anaesthetists) and Jack Greenhalgh (Cardiac Nurse). We were accompanied by our support crew consisting of Lisa Owens and James Huntington (both Operating Department Practitioners) who brought all our bikes and luggage on THLoF minibus all the way from Torquay to Wick. So, we flew with just our hand luggage to Inverness and then took a taxi to Wick.

That very evening (2.07.2011) we have witnessed traditional Scottish Pipe Festival on the central square of Wick followed by traditional dancing superbly performed by little lassies from the Highlands. The evening ended in the Alexander Bain (inventor of electrical clock and telegraph) pub with lots of pasta in preparation for our first day. It seems like the rest of the town was there too. It was very lively with a local band finishing off the evening.

So, back to the start. The day was bright and sunny and that really set us off with a lot of enthusiasm on a long road down South back home to Devon. Well, via Land's End, actually. First few miles and no rain! Half a day and no rain! Scotland is beautiful when the sun is out and we had it for the whole first two days until we started our Day 3 from Invergarry Hotel down to Loch Ness. But we were well prepared for that with all our waterproof gear so nobody melted.

It took us 5 days to clear Scotland and it was not as hilly as back in Devon where we trained in preparation for the trip. But our real first challenge came at the end of Day 6 going up the Kirkstone Pass approaching Ambleside at the end of 75 miles ride. The climb was steep (up to 20%) and nearly 3 miles long and it took us long time to climb it but somebody few hundred years ago strategically put Kirkstone Pass Inn on the top where we eventually ended up for a pint to celebrate!

Next day we made it to Shrewsbury and have been invited for a lovely dinner to the famous Shrewsbury School where Charles Darwin was once a pupil. Very welcoming back to England evening with a superb atmosphere of friendliness.

Long cycling, my friends, is all about coffee breaks and lunches and some (75 miles a day on average) cycling in between. By the Day 5 or 6 your saddle soreness usually settled (thanks to Chamois cream!) and you begin to enjoy the ride itself. Fitness goes up and climbing the hills becomes much easier and you don't have to stop every time you reach the top of the mountain to catch your breath.

Shrewsbury to Preston, Preston to Monmouth for some Welsh experience and then over the Severn Bridge back to West Country. We got lost a bit trying to find the way to Avon Bridge but eventually we were on it and then down cycling via Avonmouth, along the coast and finished that day in Taunton where we saw "Transformers" in 3D at the local Odeon Cinema. I felt like I was on a School trip again! But the next day was one of the best going down along A38 via Tiverton and Crediton to Moretonhampstead and over Dartmoor finishing in Two Bridges. Long and challenging but worth every mile of it, especially on a fine day like ours. Having cycled from the top of the UK we have definitely realised that we live in the most beautiful and unspoiled part of the country. Devon is the best!

Staying at Two Bridges Hotel was an unforgettable experience not only due to great food and local drinks but also to the fact that

most of us were visited by our family members. Next day we were on our way to Newquay and my son, Dmitry, joined us for the day to support all of us and to keep his fitness up for his cross-Torbay Charity swim. And although the day was rather short (only 59 miles) but it was the hilliest so far. Spending late afternoon on the Great Western beach in Newquay provided some compensation for our efforts though.

Our last day down to Land's End was going to be shortest but who would have thought that it will be so rainy and accompanied by two accidents of chain and derailer coming off and requiring stopping and some mending 4 miles before the end of the road.

But eventually we were there at the Land's End met by lots of friends and family members. What a joy and an amazing feeling of achievement! Even the weather cleared up to allow us to take few good pictures in front of the famous sign. We have shared champagne, food, jokes, hugs and kisses but most of us felt slightly sad that it was all over. Very mixed feeling were overwhelming all of us as we were heading back to our homes.

Was it worth it? Definitely! We came back fitter, happier, have learnt a great deal about each

other and about history of our country and last but not the least managed to collect nearly £5000 for Torbay Hospital League of Friends! Such a nice feeling to give something back to the organisation that was supporting our hospital for years and years. With this we say "Thank you" to THLoF for all your generosity! We are really grateful to and to all those who have sponsored us and wrote some remarkable , witty and funny comments on our fund raising website.
