Critical Care Unit Appeal Update

s all our readers know, having raised over £15m for Torbay Hospital in the past ▶ 60 years, The Torbay Hospital League of Friends agreed, as part of its Diamond Anniversary in 2014, to raise £1.6m to equip the new 'state of the art' Critical Care Unit currently being built at the Hospital

This £15m project to deliver a new critical care unit (CCU) and main entrance is now well under way at Torbay Hospital, with the opening of the new facilities currently planned for early 2017.

Mairead McAlinden, Chief Executive of the Trust tells us: "Following demolition of the old main entrance last summer, the ground work has been completed, and the sub-structures and foundations for the new building are now in place.

The installation of the building frame is now underway and is scheduled to be completed and fully watertight by mid-summer 2016. This will be followed by fitting out the building up to late autumn 2016.

Testing and commissioning of the building services will be completed towards the end of 2016. We will then start equipping the new facility including installing the 'state-of-the-art' medical equipment funded by our Leagues, ready for planned opening in early 2017."


The public have responded amazingly well to our current Critical Care Unit Appeal, as have the District Hospital Leagues, who have donated generously. The Unit is going



Christine Piper

At our Management Committee in January this year Christine said that she felt the time had come for her to hang up her abacus. She said "I now find myself with many health issues and really it is time to look after me!" She said she would work as Treasurer to the end of June 2016 and then hand over to a new person.



Everyone will know that Christine has been the Hon Treasurer for many years but not everyone will know that she has in fact being doing this job for as long as 30 years. As she says "It is a long time and things have changed enormously since I started and I seem to have grown with it!

Christine came into the job by degrees. In 1987 her mother was diagnosed with aplastic anaemia and eventually had to he put in a barrier room at the hospital. This prevented her from having any books or newspapers being taken in for her as everything had to go through a sterilising machine. The family could only see her dressed in gowns and masks. However in the barrier room there was a television provided by the League of Friends. This was her only contact with what was going on in the outside world.

A few years later the then Chairman of the League, John Pearson and long-time President Mrs. Joan Williams came into the Bank where Christine was working to ask the Manager if he could take on the Treasurership of the League of Friends. He had to decline but he put a notice round the staff to ask if anyone could take on the role. As soon as she saw it Christine said 'yes' not knowing what was involved but wanted to give something back for the TV which had been provided for her mother.

Christine says "I have seen numerous Chairpersons come and go and they all had their different ways of dealing with things. I think we have thrived as an organisation with so many folk bringing in their ideas and the democratic way in which the Committees are run. We do not always agree but everything is thrashed out so we all have a say".

As Treasurer Christine has seen many significant changes to her job due to regula-

tion and the sheer size of the organization. In the past a grant to the Hospital of over £1000 was considered a large sum but now we are endeavouring to collect £1.6m. In 1997 Christine computerized the records which brought us up to date and although she says she is "unsure whether it is quicker than hand written records I know it is all a lot neater!"

Christine's job as Treasurer is to produce Finance reports and commitment lists for the monthly Management Committee Meetings; banking donations, legacies and other cheques; dealing with the Investments to ensure that we get the best interest rate - although these days none of them are very good; prepare reports for the Inland Revenue to obtain rebates for everyone who has donated money under the Gift Aid scheme; and at the end of each month Trial Balances are done to make sure everything is in order.

Also as a Director of our Shop Butterflies on Level 2 she is in contact with June and Pat who run it on a regular basis and tries to call in there about 3 times a week.

As she says "Doing this type of work when one is retired is a good way of keeping the grey matter ticking over and is of great benefit, for oneself and the Charity"

Since being Treasurer of the League Christine reckons to have written out cheques to the Hospital for items of equipment etc. in excess of £15 million pounds.

Christine says that "I will continue to support the League as much as I can in my role of Vice President"

Patricia Roberts, President of the League said:" On behalf of the League I thank Christine Piper for the support that she has given as Treasurer for the past 30 years. We have one of the most successful League of Friends in the country and it is essential that the money that is so generously donated is managed and invested well. Christine has certainly carried out this work seriously and with enthusiasm but she now feels that the rime has come for her to step down. Many thanks Christine from us all."

Hospital Bulletin Introduction to our integrated care organisation



Hello, my name is Mairead McAlinden, and I am Chief Executive of Torbay and South Devon NHS Foundation Trust, the integrated care organisation which was formed in October 2015 when the two organisations responsible for local health

and social care services merged.

We are the first Trust in England to join-up acute and community health care with adult social care. We have over 6,000 staff and serve a local population of around 375,000.



Our vision

Our vision reflects what local people have told us they want: a community where we are all supported and empowered to be as well and as independent as possible, able to manage our own health and wellbeing, in our own homes. When we need care we have choice about how our needs are met; only having to tell our story once.

How services are changing and why

People are living longer, but often with a range of long-term conditions which means they need additional care to continue living independently. Our children also need support to reach their potential, and people need to be empowered to improve their health and wellbeing. The funding for health and social care is not keeping pace with these changing needs, so we must radically change how we provide this support and care.

As a single organisation with a joined up budget for health and social care, we are now in a better position to change the way we spend our money to better meet local needs and the choices local people have in how they access care and support. We can only invest in the new ways of providing care that our people say will be better for them by changing how and where we currently provide services.

We need to work very differently, creating new services that better support people to live well at home and in their local communities. Which we know is where most people want to be – there is no bed like your own bed.

Care will be centred around communities and people, and will be provided by coordinated teams made up of our own community health and social care staff working in partnership with our voluntary sector, mental health, housing and others. Local people want to be well and to be supported to be independent, so these local teams will focus on wellbeing, self-care and prevention of ill-health as well as providing treatment and care locally where possible.

Examples of some changes already happening:

Multiple long term conditions (MLTC) clinics

We will be investing around £225,000 in local staff to provide local services that better support people with multiple long term conditions to better understand and manage their conditions, recognizing and intervening to prevent where possible a deterioration which often results in an emergency admission to hospital.

Enhancing intermediate care

We will substantially increase the investment in intermediate care, a valuable service that helps to avoid both hospital admissions and delays in timely discharge. More importantly this service helps people to regain their independence and in many cases to return home. This investment will support community teams, extend the service across seven days and increase the input from doctors and pharmacists.

Musculo-skeletal physiotherapy teams

There are now ten rapid access musculo-skeletal physiotherapy teams based locally

across South Devon and Torbay where people can refer themselves for assessment, advice and a treatment plan. This may include onward referral for a specialist physiotherapist and/or consultant orthopaedic opinion. We offer an appointment the same day, next day or the day after at clinics in the community.

Wellbeing coordinators

Wellbeing coordinators are being funded to work in the voluntary sector in each area, supporting our local staff to provide care around 'what matters *to* you' rather than 'what is the matter *with* you'.

GP referrals

Closer links and partnership working between GPs and hospital specialists should mean quicker diagnosis and treatment for many patients as well as fewer costly and time-consuming visits to hospital.

What will success look like?

If we get this change right, the people of Torbay and South Devon will:

- receive more of their long term care closer to where they live, by a team that knows them, and they tell their story only once.
- be involved in decisions about their health and care and offered lifestyle support
- As a population we will be healthier and better supported to 'live our lives to the full'

Who are the Junior League?

Torquay Girls Grammar School (TGGS) actively encourages students to take an energetic role in supporting the local



"Being trapped in the car for over two

hours was a scary experience and I'm so thankful to only escape with bruises.

"A local man on a motorbike saw the crash happen and stayed with me for the whole time I was in the car."It was a wonderful thing to do.
